




HIGHLIGHTS


- In February, 391 individuals; 314 Somali returnees and 77 Yemeni refugees, arrived from Yemen and were received by UNHCR and partners in Somalia;
- Access to education was provided to 581 refugee children;
- Health care assistance was provided to 671 Yemeni refugees by UNHCR and partners;
- UNHCR and partners distributed cash assistance to 718 Yemeni refugee households, comprising of 1,383 individuals, to meet their basic needs.

POPULATION OF CONCERN


A total of 391 people of concern in February 2017




A total of 776 people of concern in 2017



ARRIVALS FROM YEMEN IN FEBRUARY 2017




Arrivals by month and nationality



UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS



Protection

- New arrivals from Yemen: During February, six boats carrying 391 new arrivals, including 314 Somali returnees and 77 Yemeni refugees, were received in Somalia.
- Arrival assistance: At the port in Somaliland and Puntland, and at the way station in Mogadishu, UNHCR provided new arrivals with information on available services and entitlements through UNHCR and partners, refreshments, and screening and medical checks. New arrivals were also provided with hot meals and accommodation at the reception centre in Berbera and way station Mogadishu.



UNHCR received Somali returnees from Yemen at the port Berbera

- Registration: UNHCR, in collaboration with partners Ministry of Resettlement, Rehabilitation and Reconstruction (MRRR) in Somaliland and Puntland Ministry of Interior (MoI), registered a total of 161 persons; 79 Somali returnees and 82 Yemeni refugees, including five Yemeni refugee children born in Somalia.
- Lifted suspension in Somaliland: On 14 February, the Government of Somaliland lifted the suspension on arrivals from Yemen under the condition that new arrivals are screened prior to their departure in Yemen.

Education

Access to education: To enable people of concern to access to education, UNHCR, through Action Africa Help International (AAH-I), Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) and Save the Children International (SCI), supported a total of 581 Yemeni refugee students. Out of 581 students, 481 had access to primary education, 52 to secondary education, and 48 to tertiary education.



Access to health care: In February, UNHCR provided medical services through partners Gruppo per le Relazioni Transculturali (GRT), HANANO Medical Center and Hargeisa Group Hospital (HGH) to 671 Yemeni and Ethiopian refugees; 315 in Somaliland, 285 in south and central regions of Somalia and 71 in Puntland.



Food Security and Nutrition

- At the reception center in Berbera and Bossaso, new arrivals were provided with hot meals (except at the reception centre in Bossaso) and refreshments, and had access to potable water and sanitation.
- Gap: UNHCR continues to advocate for the provision of food at the reception centre in Bossaso. Several meetings have been held between Puntland MoI and the World Food Program (WFP) to address and find a solution for the lack of food provided to new arrivals.



ogistics.

Transport allowance: Onward transportation allowance was provided by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) to 91 Yemeni refugees to enable them to reach various regions in south and central Somalia, Somaliland and Puntland.



Reintegration

- Entrepreneurship: UNHCR, through National Commission for Refugees and IDPs (NCRI), held an initial training session on entrepreneurship for 67 Yemeni refugees in Mogadishu.
- Subsistence allowance: In February, UNHCR and partner NCRI provided subsistence allowance to 718 Yemeni refugee households, comprising of 1,383 individuals (700 households in Puntland and 18 in south and central regions of Somalia).
- Subsistence allowance: Vulnerable Yemeni refugees in Mogadishu, identified through vulnerability assessments, will be entitled to receive subsistence allowance to meet their basic needs through UNHCR partner International Rescue Committee (IRC).
- Small business grants: UNHCR, through Action in Semi-Arid Lands (ASAL), completed the initial registration of 325 Somali returnees and 60 vulnerable host community households for the provision of small business grants and skills training in Garowe and Bossaso.
- Vocational training: UNHCR, through partner DRC, began the identification of 40 Yemeni refugees to target for vocational skills training in electronics, tailoring, hair dressing, baking and fishing.
